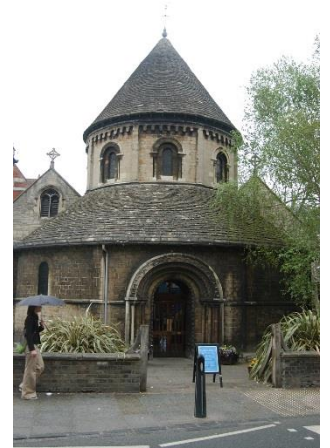


## Medieval Cambridge: History & Architecture

Wednesday 7 to Saturday 10 September 2016

Jon Cannon has put together this course to give you a taste of the history, art and architectural heritage of the Medieval era, bringing to life the transformation of the city from Fen-edge market town to international centre of learning. On this course you will visit the oldest building in Cambridge (dating back to the Saxon era), one of only five surviving round churches in Britain; Jesus College and the incomparable King's College Chapel.



## Medieval Churches, Monasteries and Cathedrals of the Fenlands

Friday 19 to Sunday 21 May 2017

Jon Cannon will reveal a world in which many buildings stood on islands in the Fenlands. A world that is at once familiar and exotic, horrifying and beautiful and in which local saints, all but forgotten now, such as Etheldreda and Guthlac shaped the architecture. During this course you will learn to distinguish between the various different architectural styles to be seen in a wide range of structures – from ruined monasteries through to functioning parish churches and the magnificent Ely Cathedral.

## Anglo-Saxon & Norman History & Architecture

Sunday 21 to Tuesday 23 May 2017

The Anglo-Saxon & Norman era is a defining one for English art and English identity yet it is an easily overlooked foundation period in English history, from which so little architecture survives. This course will visit several of these memorable buildings, with their distinctive and energetic architectural forms, (including Earls Barton and Brixworth) as well as two of the mighty Romanesque churches that replaced them (St Albans and Waltham Abbey).



## Medieval East Anglia: Cities, Towns and Villages

Monday 5 to Friday 9 June 2017

During this four day course Jon Cannon will uncover a lost world that shaped much of where we live today. Through churches, houses, guildhalls and street plans Jon will reveal how medieval towns grew, worked and worshipped. You will visit towns dominated by a single great monastic house (such as Peterborough), cosmopolitan ports like King's Lynn and market towns such as Stamford.
